Impose a 10-ounce limit for marijuana kept at residences and require amounts over 2.5 ounces be secured in locked containers. Create a state licensing system for marijuana businesses and allow municipalities to ban or restrict them. Permit retail sales of marijuana and edibles subject to a 10% tax, dedicated to implementation costs, clinical trials, schools, roads, and municipalities where marijuana businesses are located. Change several current violations from crimes to civil infractions. <p>Should this proposal be adopted?</p> <p>Yes <input type="radio"/></p> <p>No <input type="radio"/></p> <p>Proposal 18-2 A proposed constitutional amendment to establish a commission of citizens with exclusive authority to adopt district boundaries for the Michigan Senate, Michigan House of Representatives and U.S. Congress, every 10 years</p> <p>This proposed constitutional amendment would:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Create a commission of 13 registered voters randomly selected by the Secretary of State: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> 4 each who self-identify as affiliated with the 2 major political parties; and 5 who self-identify as unaffiliated with major political parties. Prohibit partisan officeholders and candidates, their employees, certain relatives, and lobbyists from serving as commissioners. Establish new redistricting criteria including geographically compact and contiguous districts of equal population, reflecting Michigan's diverse population and communities of interest. Districts shall not provide disproportionate advantage to political parties or candidates. Require an appropriation of funds for commission operations and commissioner compensation. <p>Should this proposal be adopted?</p> <p>Yes <input type="radio"/></p> <p>No <input type="radio"/></p> <p>Proposal 18-3 A proposal to authorize automatic and Election Day voter registration, no-reason absentee voting, and straight ticket voting; and add current legal requirements for military and overseas voting and post-election audits to the Michigan Constitution</p> <p>This proposed constitutional amendment would allow a United States citizen who is qualified to vote in Michigan to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Become automatically registered to vote when applying for, updating or renewing a driver's license or state-issued personal identification card, unless the person declines. Simultaneously register to vote with proof of residency and obtain a ballot during the 2-week period prior to an election, up to and including Election Day. Obtain an absent voter ballot without providing a reason. Cast a straight-ticket vote for all candidates of a particular political party when voting in a partisan general election. <p>Should this proposal be adopted?</p> <p>Yes <input type="radio"/></p> <p>No <input type="radio"/></p>	<p>Grosse Pointe Public Schools Bond Proposal</p> <p>Shall the Grosse Pointe Public School System, County of Wayne, Michigan, borrow the principal sum of not to exceed One Hundred Eleven Million Forty Thousand Dollars (\$111,040,000) and issue its general obligation unlimited tax bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> remodeling and/or constructing additions, primarily additions for secure vestibules, to existing School District buildings, including security, roof, energy conservation and mechanical systems improvements; equipping, furnishing, reequipping and refurbishing School District buildings; acquiring and installing technology infrastructure and instructional technology equipment; and improving and developing sites, including outdoor athletic facilities, paving, fencing, and drains, in the School District? <p>The debt millage levy required to retire all bonds of the School District currently outstanding and proposed by this ballot proposal is estimated to be at or below 1.50 mills higher than the debt millage levy for 2018. The estimated millage to be levied in 2019 to service this issue of bonds is 1.82 mills (\$1.82 per \$1,000 of taxable value) and the estimated simple average annual millage rate required to retire the bonds of this issue is 2.21 mills (\$2.21 per \$1,000 of taxable value). The bonds may be issued in multiple series, payable in the case of each series in not to exceed 21 years from the date of issue of such series.</p> <p>(Under State law, bond proceeds may not be used to pay teacher or administrator salaries, routine maintenance or repair costs or other School District operating expenses.)</p> <p>Yes <input type="radio"/></p> <p>No <input type="radio"/></p> <p>Community College</p> <p>Wayne County Community College District Replacement Operating Millage Proposal</p> <p>This proposal will allow Wayne County Community College District to levy 2.25 mills for operating purposes, permanently replacing and combining two separate existing authorizations which would otherwise expire in 2020 and 2022.</p> <p>To continue to provide operating funds to the Wayne County Community College District and as a replacement of existing authority which would otherwise expire in 2020 and 2022, shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be imposed on taxable property in the Wayne County Community College District be permanently increased by 2.25 mills (\$2.25 per \$1,000 of taxable value), beginning in 2019?
